Problem Properties

First, thank you to both Tom Deegan and Greg Simbeck (Problem Properties Unit and Regulatory Services) for attending the June BNA meeting and talking about how and when a property becomes a 'problem' and what happens after that. Those attending also generated a list of about a dozen neighborhood properties that were of some concern for various reasons (unmowed lawn, loud parties, suspicious activity, torn screens, and other similar issues). Some of the identified properties are single family homes, some duplexes and one is an apartment building. Some of these properties have no active violations; one has six. They range from tall grass to water damage to unlicensed work. Five of them have been recently foreclosed.

Tom Deegan and Greg Simbeck both indicated that the City is being overwhelmed by the increasing number of vacant, foreclosed, boarded, and/or problem properties (see Foreclosures NE on page 2.). There are not enough staff and financial resources to keep up. This were neighborhoods can enter the picture. There are numerous things neighborhoods can do to help reduce the number of problem properties. In fact, neighborhoods are generally more effective at many of these than the City could ever hope to be because neighborhoods work at a grass-roots level and are more easily able to take proactive actions and not simply respond to complaints. Please join us at the July neighborhood meeting to make some decisions on actions the Bottineau neighborhood should take to help address this issue.

What should we have for dinner? So begins the introduction to the Omnivore's Dilemma (Michael Pollan, Penguin Press, 2006). Before even finishing this book you realize that is not as simple a question as it would appear. Pollan discusses the prevalence of corn in our diets and the relationship to the obesity epidemic in this country. Corn and corn derived products make up 13 of the 38 ingredients in a McDonalds Chicken McNugget. We are also the only country with both obesity and malnourishment issues. Think organic is any better? Not necessarily. That organic broccoli from Chili you bought the other day may have added as much as four pounds of carbon into the atmosphere as a result of all the shipping. One of the solutions he offers is to buy local. Here in Northeast we have that option every Saturday.

The Northeast Farmer's Market is open for business! The market will continue to be located in the parking lot of St. Boniface Catholic Church, at the intersection of University and 7th Avenue NE, across from Emily's Lebanese Deli.



The market season began the season on Saturday, June 2nd and will run through October. Hours are 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Emphasis is on locally-grown produce, flowers and plants and other locally-produced items. Special events such as a corn feed, bake sale, and fall festival are held during the Farmers Market season.

Bicycle Improvements Coming Your Way

The City recently announced \$250,000 in bicycle improvements for NE Minneapolis. Here is some information on what can be expected (from www.tlcminnesota.org).

Central Avenue NE Planning Study.

This study will examine options for improving conditions for bicyclists along Central Avenue NE from the Mississippi River to 37th Avenue NE.

5th Street NE. This 1.97 mile project will connect Northeast Minneapolis to the University of Minnesota and Southeast Minneapolis. It will add a "bicycle boulevard" treatment (a street that gives priority to bicyclists) and bicycle lanes. The project also includes signage, striping, sealcoating, bicycle racks, curb cuts, and non-permanent traffic diverters.

Plymouth Avenue N/8th Avenue NE

This is a 1.08 mile project connecting Northeast Minneapolis to existing bike lanes in North Minneapolis (2nd Street N). The project includes adding bike lanes to the Plymouth Ave N./8th Ave NE corridor by reducing some four-lane portions of the corridor to three or two lanes, and innovative signage for a three-block area.

22nd Avenue NE. This is a 2.21 mile bicycle boulevard project on 22nd Avenue NE. The boulevard will have 25 mph speed limits, "no passing cyclists" signage, special pavement markings, non-permanent traffic diverters, fewer stops, speed bumps, and improved crossings at busy streets.

The Bottineau Neighborhood Association (and very likely other impacted neighborhoods) has not heard anything about when these projects might begin. We will post updates when we get them.
