Foreclosure Rate Slowing and Some Help

Recent data from the Hennepin County Sherriff 's Office and the City of Minneapolis shows a decrease in the number of foreclosures in Minneapolis for the first four months of 2008 compared to the same period last year. The number is still fairly astonishing - 91 in the 3rd Ward during this period, four of those were in Bottineau.

While this is bad news, there is some good news to report. PRG, a local non-

profit located at 2017 E. 38th St. has mortgage foreclosure counselors available to assist people who need advice about their mortgages. The counselors can help you understand your mortgage and provide tools to work with your lender if you are behind on your mortgage payments. The counseling is free, confidential and is available to anyone who is facing mortgage concerns. There is no lower or upper income limit. You can reach them at (612) 804-7025 or (612) 805-7756. 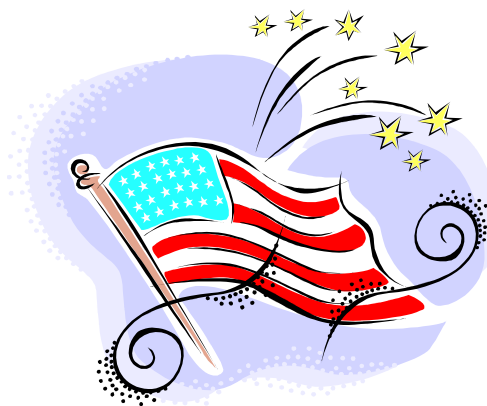
