Islam in Bottineau



On May 24 at East Side Neighborhood Services, Dr. Hamdy El-Sawaf and Jaylani Hussein spoke and answered questions at the "Islam in Bottineau" forum sponsored by BNA.

Dr. El-Sawaf is a local psychoanalyst, University of Minnesota professor and Imam at Masjid Al-Iman Islamic community center in Sheridan Neighborhood. Jaylani Hussein is executive director of the Council on American Islamic Relations-Minnesota (CAIR-MN).

At the forum, Dr. El-Sawaf presented a short primer on Islam, followed by a 60 minute question and answer session. Below is a brief excerpt from the Q&A session:

Q 1: If the Koran gives clear instructions, [how is it] that so many people can distort those teachings, i.e. why do you think young people—even in our community—become radicalized?

A1: Many profess to be believers in Islam yet but they fail to act upon the actual teaching of Islam. A2: Youth are especially susceptible to

predators. For instance, there are sexual predators that target youth, there are religious predators as well, and many exploit youth and deceive them.

Q 9: Why do young girls wear headscarves?

A1: When a girl reaches puberty she is telling men I am not for everyone, I am for the one who will pick me out of the millions of women. It is an honor to wear the scarf. It is beautiful to show this modesty and respect. But not only the scarf is worn; the whole body is required to be dressed modestly. Muslim cultures around the world have differing definitions of "modest dress" but tight jeans with a head scarf are not modest. The term for this scarf and dress is Hajib.

Bottineau Residents Tour Minneapolis Water Works

On May 27, a number of Bottineau residents—all of whom live on or near the Mississippi River—toured the Minneapolis water treatment plant at 4500 Marshall St. NE.

Minneapolis Water Works purifies 70 million gallons of water per day. Most of this water is consumed in Minneapolis, but the City also sells water to other municipalities such as Edina, Bloomington, Crystal and Columbia Heights. If you didn't already know, Minneapolis's tap water is sourced from the Mississippi River and has been consistently cited for producing some of the cleanest and best tasting water in the United States.

Lucian Osuji, Water Bacteriologist and Chemist, led this group on the tour. Other group tours can be scheduled by calling Water Quality Manager George Kraynick at 612-661-4923.

Local Relief Fund for Ecuador Quake Victims

On April 16th, Ecuador was devastated by an earthquake that registered 7.8 on the Richter scale. Many of the victims from this quake are related to Bottineau residents. Because of this, Bottineau Neighborhood Association was asked by the City of Minneapolis to act as the fiscal agent to hire a community organizer, Mary Anne Quiroz, to assist with the relief effort. Mary Anne set up a "go fund me" page whereby funds can securely be sent to those who need it most, the homeless.

'Water Wednesdays' Workshop Series at MWMO



We all want to do our part to protect our water resources. And we all want to be good neighbors, taking good care of our yards. But not everyone realizes these two things are connected.

This summer, the Mississippi Watershed Management Organization (MWMO) is offering a series of "Water Wednesdays" workshops on sustainable yard care. People of all skill levels are invited to learn how changing the way we care for our lawns, gardens and landscapes can help the environment by preventing pollution, protecting water quality and providing habitat.

From June through August, the second Wednesday of each month will feature a workshop at the MWMO Stormwater Park and Learning Center (2522 Marshall St. NE). These free classes will offer practical tips on how to capture, clean and reuse stormwater runoff and provide pollinator habitat in your own yard. June 6, 1872 – Susan B. Anthony was fined for voting in a presidential election. After voting rights were secured for African-American men by the 15th Amendment, she attempted to assert those same rights for women by leading a group of women to test their status as citizens by voting illegally in Rochester, NY.
