

Accounting

Total revenue earned at the event—from the sales of raffle tickets, beer and silent auction lots—came to \$4886. After expenses, the benefit raised a total of \$3886, all of which will be used to pay expenses for phase II of the Cancer and Asthma Study. The raffle grossed the most funds with 475 tickets sold at \$5.00 a piece, totaling \$2376. In addition, the silent auction raised \$1900 and beer sales contributed another \$610. The Northeast RiverKeepers coordinated beer sales and provided bartending help. Overall, BNA was assisted by a total of 32 volunteers who worked on the event this year. As a result, BNA raised more than 4 times as much money as last year's effort. As John Olson put it: "We hit it outta the park this year."

Home Improvement Funds Available for Bottineau Residents

A major component of a healthy neighborhood is a healthy housing stock. Toward that end, home improvement funds are available through the Greater Metropolitan Housing Corporation. Following is a summary of funds available to Bottineau homeowners.

Bottineau Matching Grant

This grant is available for owner occupied and absentee owner properties in Bottineau neighborhood. Minnesota Housing Finance Agency Fix-up Fund projects are also eligible. The minimum grant offered is \$1,000 and the maximum is \$2,000. Applicants must be current on mortgage and taxes. Sweat Equity is allowed.

Mpls Community Fix Up Loan

The Minneapolis Community Fix up Loan offers owner-occupied households in selected neighborhoods a 2% interest rate for loans up to \$20,000. Single-family detached homes, condos and townhomes are eligible. Most interior and exterior improvements qualify. Maximum household income is \$98,700. A housing inspection to be conducted by a Housing Resource

Center construction manager is required. Any code or health and safety issues that are cited in the inspection report must be addressed to qualify for the program.

Mpls Home Improvement Loan Program

This loan program is available in all neighborhoods of the City. Only owner-occupied single-family detached homes qualify.

- Homeowners that have a gross annual income up to 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) may qualify for a no-interest deferred loan to meet basic code requirements, a red-tagged furnace and health and safety improvements. The maximum loan amount is \$25,000.

- Homeowners that qualify for either loan program may also qualify for a lead grant to reduce lead levels in their home, as required by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

There is normally a waiting list for this program. For more information, please call the HousingResource Center at (612)588-3033.

Minnesota Housing Fix-Up Loan

The HousingResource Centers offer low interest loans including the Minnesota Housing Fix-Up Loan. This is a home improvement loan for up to \$50,000 at a fixed interest rate. The loan term may be up to 20 years. These loans can be used to repair, remodel or keep your home warm and save money too! Contact the HousingResource Center for the current interest rate and income limits. Ask about new Fix-Up loan features that include unsecured loans

up to \$15,000 with no equity requirement, and loans at a reduced interest rate when used exclusively for basic energy-saving or accessibility improvements; maximum loan \$15,000.

In History

- Dec. 2, 1954 – The U.S. Senate condemned Senator Joseph McCarthy for misconduct following his ruthless investigation of thousands of U.S. citizens accused of being Communists.
- Dec. 3, 1984 – A deadly leak of more than 40 tons of methyl isocyanate gas at a Union Carbide plant in Bhopal, India, killed at least 3,000 persons and injured more than 200,000. Though the company attempted to disassociate itself from legal responsibility, it eventually reached a settlement with the Indian government, paying \$470 million in compensation. As many as 20,000 premature deaths reportedly occurred in the 20 years that followed this disaster.
